The board has been concerned with trying to increase the attendance at our monthly meetings. And, Art Roth has accepted the challenge.

Our division has had a number of successful High Wheeler shows which put us in a far better financial position than we faced when I was first elected to the

board nine years ago. We are no longer in the position of having to live hand to mouth in order for our division to survive. We can afford to spend some of our resources.

Our program will begin with a trip to the Illinois Railway Museum in Union, Illinois. The division will provide a bus and will pay the entrance fee for all members who join s on the bus. The October trip will also be a bus tour to the famous Batavia Model Railroad Club. There is a possibility that we may also visit some of the other clubs along the Fox River.

November will find us back at the Prospect Heights Park District for several clinics and a contest or two.

Because of the fantastic response of those who took the El tour of Chicago at the *Smilepost* convention, we are considering returning for a trip in December to see Chicago at night in the holiday season. This trip is still in the planning stages but will involve bus transportation to and from the beginning and end of the trip. Because it is **very expensive** to rent an El Train, there will be a charge for this trip, but we will try to keep it in line with our policy of using our treasury for the benefit of the membership.

High Wheeler is presenting us with problems this year. We have been informed that Forest View will be unavailable for a two day show. This leaves us with the choices of having a one day show, returning to Harper College, or having no show at all. We have been unable to find any other acceptable location for our show unless we were to consider a non-profit mall show or a one day show at a park district which would be much smaller. I will keep you posted as to the developments on this front. Stay tuned.

WHAT IN THE WORLD IS THE FOX VALLEY DIVISION?

(And How Did I Get There?)

Those were the thoughts running through my mind about four months after I joined the NMRA at the Chicago Model Hobby Show a few years ago. I had received a Semaphore, telling me about a club called the Fox Valley Division that was meeting in Arlington Heights. I had never joined the club, so I did not know what was going on. The Semaphore got put aside and forgotten for the next year; then they stopped coming.

Here's what I didn't know: The Fox Valley Division is one of nine divisions in the Midwest Region of the National Model Railroad Association. As a benefit of NMRA membership, all members are placed in a region and division. The region gets the new member's name from NMRA headquarters in Chattanooga, Tennessee. The region then notifies the correct division that they have a new member. New Fox Valley Division members receive the Semaphore for one year. After that, only active members receive it. An active member attends ONE meeting every year. Twice a year, the Fox Valley Division sends the Semaphore to all members, active or not. That is the reason many members are holding this issue.

I learned of the Fox Valley Division's NMRA affiliation three years later when I started working for Palatine Hobby. As the manager at Palatine Hobby, I worked closely with the *High Wheeler '93* Planning Committee. That relationship continued, and I became the Membership Trainmaster in May.

I'm still learning all the little things about the Fox Valley Division, but I can tell anyone that we are a bunch of good-natured people who have a sincere interest in model railroading. You don't have to own any model railroad equipment to enjoy the meetings. Art Roth, our Program Trainmaster, has some great plans for trips and meetings. Why not stop by? We would love to meet you!

Saturday, December 18, 5:00 p.m. El Ride — Christmas Magic Carpet Ride




This completely private V.I.P. ride by private cars is very expensive. So, in order to defray the expense to your division treasury we will have to ask \$10.00 per person. First come, first on list. The conventioneers piled out of the school buses and headed toward the station, marched through the turnstyle, passed the newsstand, out onto the platform, and boarded the two elevated cars that were to take us on a magic carpet ride.

Somehow I thought the cars would be green and white. I, like a lot of people hadn't been on the El for ten or fifteen years.

We started in Wilmette at ground level, and were soon climbing above the streets. We picked up speed, heading

for the Chicago Loop.

I had the best seat in the car. My private guide, Jerry Hoffman sat next to me. He knew every street, building, and lamp post. He pointed out where he had worked for many years, and all the landmarks.

Tom Hoffman wandered up and down the cars all smiles. The trip was perfect. All your planning can go

wrong. That was not the case on this trip.

Steel wheels on steel track rumbled smoothly toward Chicago as the sun went down. The conductor ordered the motorman to turn out the interior lights, and the light show began.

High rise buildings lit up to the right of us. T.V. towers flashed to the left of us. Street lights popped on, as well as, kitchen and hallway lights in the houses on the edge of the

track.

A rainbow of colors were represented by the neon signs that were everywhere.

The light show intensified as we snaked past the stations like a phantom ship, dark and mysterious, toward
