Superintendent's Report

Perhaps the worst part about being Superintendent is receiving a phone call from family members or friends of division members informing me that one of our division members has passed away. Such was the case this past Monday when Bert Ahrensfeld's daughter called telling me that Bert had passed away on Sunday, October 24th. Bert had suffered a stroke about a year and a half ago and had, as a result, greatly decreased his involvement in division activities. Bert had been a member of the NMRA since the mid 1940's and was a life member. He grew up in Oak Park as the son of the vice president of one of the major downtown hanks. He attended Northwestern University where he was a member of the naval ROTC. Often he would tell us stories about the summer cruises he went on with the Atlantic Fleet where he was a turret captain on one of the fleet's battleships. Bert worked for Addressograph-Multigraph Corporation for many years and retired about fifteen or twenty years ago. He was preceded in death by his wife Vera and is survived by his two daughters Jan and Joyce, several grandchildren and great-grandchildren.

Retirement gave him an opportunity to pursue his many interests, chief among which was working on his Palatine Midland Railroad. The Palatine Midland was a railroad which told the story of the evolution of model railroading. Begun in the 1950's and set in the mountains of Colorado, it started as a continuous loop with a huge plaster mountain. As point to point layouts began to be the standard, Bert determined to change

his layout to conform to the latest trends. As operation became popular Bert developed an operating scheme for the Palatine Midland that truly made sense. The railroad was a dream to operate because of the planning and careful construction Bert had put into it. The last stage of the railroad was an expansion to Salt Lake City which was completed shortly before Bert had his stroke.

Bert gave much to our division whether in terms of working at High Wheeler at the construction table, (Bert was an expert at building craftsmen kits) or offering his layout for open houses, or simply offering encouragement in our efforts at modeling. He was a gentleman and friend to many in our division including myself. His presence will truly be missed by all.

As we walked down the tracks Bob, my other grandson never stopped jumping up and down looking into windows of the equipment.

All day long I kept looking for the Shay. I knew they had one and I had told the boys about it. We learned it was in the repair shed, but we only had tem minutes till the bus would leave. I told the boys we would have to come back and see it next time. With a yell of "Yea!" we boarded the bus.

If you didn't return yours it is still not too late. It is stamped and addressed so it is easy to return.


ELECTION OF OFFICERS
