Hints, Tips, and Innovations

Can you remember your first layout? Was it a Christmas gift? Was it set up under the tree? Or was it wrapped up? "My" first layout was set up under the tree: American Flyer and Plasticville U.S.A. (those original Plasticville kits, in their original boxes, would have brought in a small fortune on E-Bay, but that is another topic altogether). I say "my" in quotes because even though I was told it was mine, I wasn't allowed to touch the first or second layout until I was much older.

Now, before you think this is just a trip down memory lane, here's the first big question: How did that first layout influence your current layout? Do you run the same lines? Do you go to the same cities and industries? Did you run mixed services then, or did you have separate freight and passenger trains? If that first layout had turnouts, did you use them to pick up and drop off cars, or to pull one train over to let an express go through? The first permanent layout my father built was close to 4'x8' with plaster of Paris cloth strips making the mountains and hiding the pylons for the grade separation. The scenery blocks were in our minds, so the fact that the siding on the dairy farm almost touched the sidings at Union Station, even though they were hundreds of miles away, was not a problem. Thinking back, it was a pretty good first layout. It had a few sidings for interest, and even has hidden staging, in a way.

I know that my first "real" layout (the one that I actually had design input on) included the Rico Station, and after I got engaged the RR line became the L&R RR - the Linville and Rico Railroad (it was only a year ago I found out that there was a Linville Station).

And here's the second question: That joy that you felt when you saw your first train (model or otherwise), have you done anything to impart that joy to anyone else? This is my grandson's first Christmas, and the train under our tree is a toy train (Dogs and kids don't really work with floor level Z layout) with remote control. We've got a simple loop, with no sidings (maybe next year). I can't begin to describe the feeling I got when I saw his jaw literally drop when he heard "All aboard" shouted from the cab and saw the train start moving. Since he can't talk yet, I'm not sure whether I impressed him or scared him, but we'll find out soon enough. He sat there watching for quite a few minutes, which, using a child's fast clock was the equivalent of almost an hour.

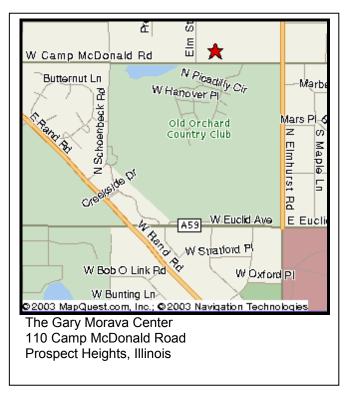
