First, I want to assure you that this is more than the bragging of a grandfather - this month's column is being written to show how the mind of at least one Model Railroader operates.

In my "real job" I am constantly on the lookout for a thing called "Scope creep." Scope creep is when a simple task slowly turns more and more complex. Let me explain in hobby terms:

If you were to visit our house this season from December to mid-January, you would have seen the now 14-month-old less

than a foot from the tracks of the simple circle of track we had beneath the tree. While the time my grandson spends with most of his toys needs a stopwatch to be measured, he has spent at least 20 minutes at each of at least 2 sessions a day in front of the train set. (At least that's how it was before I tried to "improve things")

The problem, in my mind anyway, is that it was no more than a simple oval, and I was afraid that he would get bored soon. The wheels also stuck a lot, resulting in an obnoxious plastic-on-plastic squeal. So I first replaced the wheelsets with better spinning ones and re-gauged them to fit the track. When I found a track system safe enough, I added a few turnouts for added variety. The

new track system is G guage, so I had to re-guage the wheelsets. A few hundred dollars later, I had a nice little layout, replacing the original engine with a radio controlled one. Wait, did I forget to mention that the original trainset cost \$20.00?

Now, the typical story like this would end with the child losing all interest in trains ever since Grampa "ruined" his fun, but I was lucky in that I was smart enough to let him "help" with all the improvements. In the true spirit of "World's Greatest Hobby," sharing the fun of what some may consider the boring details helped instill the love of the model railroading in the child. The bad news: he doesn't run the trains as often as he used to. The good news: he spends much of his time turning over the rolling stock, spinning the wheels and inspecting the underside of the

cars (something he never noticed with the oval set) and running cloth "sandpaper" like he saw Grampa do, to make sure the tracks are smooth. He's even starting to grasp the concept of how turnouts work, even though it still surprises him when he turns the knob and the train goes a different way. Soon, I'll explain to him what the sidings are all about. Has anyone out there tried to make a TimeSaver game out of Playmobil?

Based on this experience, things for the next generation of model railroading look hopeful, as long as no one puts a video game in his hands.

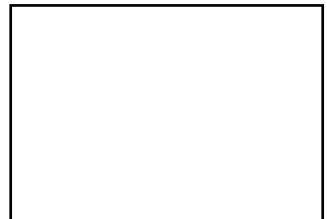
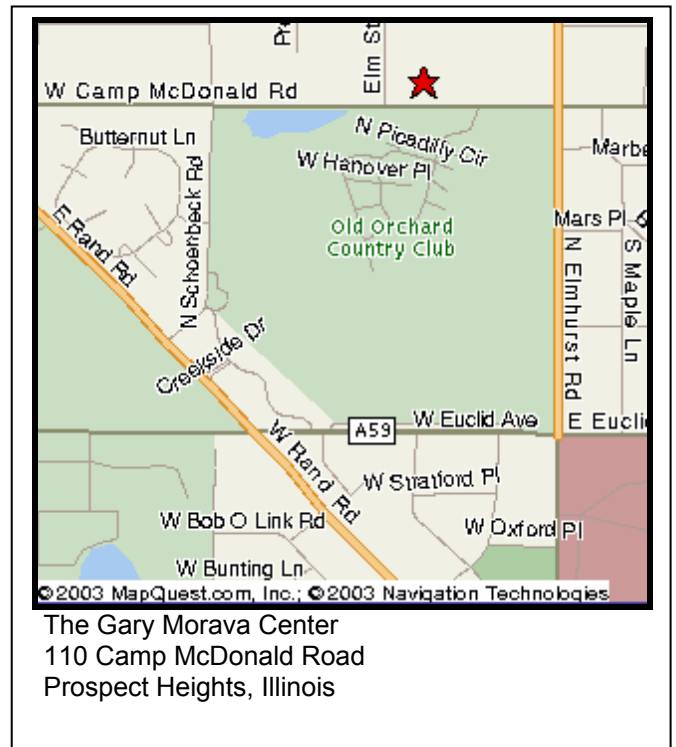
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Location for General Meetings
