Eastern European Railroads

I guess you could call this how "I spent my summer vacation". I had the occasion to visit my in-laws in Lithuania. They asked what I wanted to see, so naturally I said lots of trains. They were kind enough to drive me all over the country looking at trains as we visited other tourist stops and relatives. My brother-in law, Valdas, also arranged a tour of the yard and facilities of the Latvian railroad in Daugavpils, Latvia.

Taking photos of trains in the main stations is strictly prohibited, enforced by uniformed soldiers sporting machine guns. My wife was not about to let that stop us, so we went in search of someone to ask permission of. As far as I could tell, railfaning is unknown in Lithuania. We got blank stares and were usually pushed off to the next person in charge. Other times we were flatly told no. This did not stop my wife, who simply asked another person until she found someone who said ves.

In our quest, I got to see the CTC board, visit shop buildings and see a lot of great equipment, too bad I couldn't photograph it. We finally got permission to visit the engine shop in Klaipeda. (Watch for trains, don't go in any buildings, but photograph anything

you want). Another permission slip was required in Villnius.

Some history- they began building the railroad in 1859. It was part of a line that connected tsarist Russia's railroad in St. Petersburg with Warsaw. The first train arrived from Daugavpils to Lithuania's capital, Villnius in 1860. Regular traffic from St. Petersburg to Warsaw began in 1862. The railroads were operated as part of the Soviet Union until independence in 1990. Today they are state owned, although the railroads in Estonia, two countries north, are operated by a consortium put together by Ed Burkhardt of WC fame.

Under state control, traffic has increased tremendously, from 36.65 million tons in 2002 to 50.225 in 2006. Instead of going north-south, between St. Petersburg and Warsaw, it goes east-west, from Belarus and

Russia, to Lithuania on the Baltic Sea. Car ferries and ships complete the journey to northern Europe. Another route is used to get to Warsaw, a very important gateway to Germany and the west.

Hints, Tips, and Innovations

This month's contest and next month's contest brings up a very interesting question: Are model railroad projects ever "finished?" I must confess that most of my projects are "waiting for the finishing touches." I've got a good 10-20 circuit blocks to add to the layout (No funding for DCC decoders for all my Z engines - and no time for the microsurgery to install them), and it seems I keep changing the locations of

my industries right before finalizing the exact building size and shape. Add to that the frustration of having many of my inspirations change before I can get a good photo to model after.

My favorite unfinished project, for example, is the Dad's Root Beer Building, that used to be a prominent landmark off the Kennedy Expressway. I had to sneak on railroad property to get the shots I needed, and had the misfortune to use "questionable" film to take the picture (any of you amateur photographers remember Eastman 5247? The transparencies were not color stable). The challenge for modeling Dad's Root Beer is the Neon signs: One billboard sized sign, one roof sign, and four smokestack signs that each blink vertically: "Dad's" - "Root", Beer." The thing that made it so appealing was the shape, both horizontally and vertically: It ran parallel to a north-south street and "bent" around a tower for it's siding, parallel to the Northwestern tracks. The siding was elevated because the tracks went over the street with one of those ubiquitous Chicago viaducts. My old layout had the perfect location for the building. My new layout, well, let's just say I'm glad I didn't cement the tower to the two other parts of the building; I may have to change the angle.

I actually don't feel too bad about having this as an unfinished project. The prototype itself was an unfinished project: It started out as part of the Bowman Dairy, cow milking stalls and all. Needles to say, anyone who drives the Kennedy nowadays will probably not recognize the building as either of its previous incarnations: the signs are down, the smokestack is gone, and it got turned into townhouses!

So a few words of warning to you all: If you see something you want to model, take pictures as soon as possible! I still regret not taking pictures of the Frerk and Sons Concrete Casket sign, and the Cooper - Lamps of Distinction tower is being stripped of its distinctive lettering.
