

March Layout of the Month:

NS&W Modular Group

The North Shore and Western Modular Group began in the mid to late 1980's in the former North Shore and Western Division of the NMRA. The North Shore and Western Division is no more having merged with the Fox Valley Division in the fall of 2010, but the NS&W Modular Group has proudly preserved the NS&W name and spirit with their large and beautiful modular layout. Each year the NS&W Modular Group displays their layout four times with two of those times usually at the Glenview Public Library and the High Wheeler Train Show at Harper College. Currently the group has 36 two and half by four foot modules. The modules have a variety of themes, with some type of midwestern theme (e.g. grain elevators, stock pens, farms, "flat land" scenery, etc.) predominating. The NS&W has eight dedicated members with Jeff Jarr coordinating the group's efforts. Over the years the NS&W group has won several awards for their excellent modeling including Best Modular Layout at

both Trainfest in Milwaukee and High Wheeler at Harper College. At the 2011 World's Greatest Hobby Train Show in Schaumburg, the NS&W group combined with three other modular groups to create a monster moduler layout. High Wheeler 2013

The High Wheeler 2013 Train Show will go down in the history books as another excellent and very well attended show. Model railroaders, train enthusiasts, kids, parents and grand parents packed Harper College's field house Saturday and Sunday, March 9 and 10 to view the dozen model train layouts in all the popular scales, shop the many vendors' tables, and have fun at the kid's craft tables or train movies. Thanks to the Fox Valley Division's marketing efforts, more than 3,250 adults and 1,500 children attended this year's High Wheeler, an increase of 3% over last year's gate. Thanks to the division's management team, participating layouts and vendors enjoyed a more organized set up and additional set up time allotted for this year's show. And thanks to the division's excellent volunteers, the show went offsmoothly for participants and attendees. Commenting on this year's High Wheeler, Show Manager, JeffJarr, said, "This High Wheeler went surprisingly well considering the obstacles we faced last fall. We had our best attendance in



recorded history of the show! I can't thank our show team and volunteers enough for their excellent efforts." Asked what next year's High Wheeler will have in store for everyone, Jeff said, "Well, we will definitely try

to do the same early set up routine we did this year if Harper will let us. We will also go back to our regular dates with having the show on the first weekend in March." At this writing, about 40% of the 2013 High Wheeler layouts and vendors are signed up for the 2014 show. So High Wheeler 2014 is already shaping up to be another great one! Mike's Minute

A recent conversation with a Life Member revealed some interesting perceptions about the current condition of the NMRA. A concern was whether the NMRA as an organization is still relevant today. We had a nice interchange as a result of this conversation. Now, let me ask our FVD members: What would model railroading be today without the NMRA?

Can you imagine it? Let's see, Mr. Peabody, how about cranking up the model railroading 'Way Back machine'? Going back several decades we had: clunky track, oversize carpet tacks as track spikes, war surplus relay switch machines and primitive car couplers that don't match in shape and style (and impossible to keep coupled!), different wheel profiles (let alone in gauge-was that 1/4" scale or 17/64ths?). We had a variety of control systems from 6 vdc to 24 vdc to outside--or inside--third rail distribution systems in varying ac voltages and amps with cloth-covered--for insulation-wires, and one inch thick, heated with big flames, soldering irons. We had battery power, live steam or dry ice (dead steam?) powering systems with primitive control systems. There were engines that didn't go the same direction on the same track, and no assurance

that your engine would work on your buddy's layout. We cleaned our engines' drive systems with rags soaked in gasoline or (horrors!) carbon tetrachloride. There was no plastic (What's plastic?), and we had scenery made from asbestos furnace cement, covered in lead-based paints. A lot of times I catch myself thinking, oh, if only we knew then what we know now.

Granted, if the NMRA didn't exist, some other organization probably would be in its place to provide some overall influence, guidance and direction for the hobby. But, maybe not. If so, who knows who or what that influence, direction and guidance may have been! I think today we have a duty to the legacy of the model railroaders of old who banded together to establish the NMRA and do the hard work of developing its standards for the various scales which make for consistency and interoperability. Materials will change and things will be developed in the hobby tomorrow that we can't imagine today. Let's hope the NMRA is around to provide standards for them.

The NMRA may be over 75 years old, but it ain't dead – yet. Far from it. We as today's members owe a tip of the brass hat to our founders. I, for one, aim to keep this organization going and relevant today and into tomorrow. Got some ideas? Let me know at mhirvela1@gmail.com.

April Elections

Our April monthly meeting will be held earlier than usual at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, April 21st to accommodate this year's board elections. We will be electing an Assistant Superintendent and Treasurer. Candidate bios for Bob Shelmon, Jr., candidate for Assistant Treasurer, and Tim Kleimeyer, candidate for Treasurer, are included below. At this writing these are the only candidates running for these two offices.

Candidate for Assistant Superintendent, Bob Shlemon, Jr.

In 2012 Bob was appointed by the FVD board to fill the Assistant Superintendent position when Harry Sorenson resigned due to health reasons. He would like to continue on serving



the division as its Assistant Super. The position has involved Bob in many different parts of the FVD and the model railroading hobby which he has enjoyed. Bob started in model railroading when he was given my first train at

the age of six with an S Scale American Flyer. As his interest grew he switched to HO Scale, started going to assorted train shows including the 1976 National Train Show held in Rosemont (NMRA National connected). In 1977 Bob joined the NMRA and three years later upgraded to life member. He's been involved with clubs and the NS&W Division in which he served in their early years in various posts including Refreshment Chairmen, Assistant Superintendent, and Editor of the 400 Bulletin. In the last years of the NS&W

Bob and his son Eddy helped in any capacity they could, including the NS&W Modular Group. Since the merger of the NS&W and FVD, Eddy and Bob have been attending FVD meetings and helping out in any way they could, including the refreshment area.

Candidate for Treasurer, Tim Kleimeyer

Tim Kleimeyer is our current Paymaster and is running for re-election. He has been our Paymaster since being elected in 2004. Prior to that, Tim was our Assistant



Superintendent. He models the Chicago area in HO in the mid 1990's. His layout will include Metra, UP (CNW), and the Sleepy Creek Railway, part of the CNW UP did not want. Tim started with American Flyer in the 1950s and still has his original "S" scale trains all of which are in working order.

As Paymaster, Tim pays the division bills and reimburses members for approved expenses made on behalf of the division. Each month, he balances the checkbook and presents a financial statement to the BOD. He also makes the annual report to the membership at the April business meeting. For High Wheeler, Tim is on site both days of the show managing the cash flow from the ticket sellers and the door prize give away. With the new IRS rules for reporting for small non-profit organizations, Tim has been doing the IRS filing each year.


About the Fox Valley Division
