I can hear the questions coming already: why are you featuring a layout in the Semaphore that's from Ft. Meyers, Florida? Don't you know we're in the Chicago area for cryin' out loud?! And my response is, "You are absolutely right. The Fox Valley Division is in Chicago and its north and northwest suburbs and 'super boonies.'" But, by way of explanation, as I write this, I am right now in Isles of Capri, Florida near Marco Island and I don't have a "Layout of the Month" for the April Semaphore except for this one. In addition, the Scale Rails of Southwest Florida club is an all NMRA member club, and the Semaphore would like to cover an N scale layout when it gets the chance. Soooo, the SRSWF's N scale layout it is this month!

I found this layout in February at a Ft. Meyers Train Show. In talking with SRSWF members who were manning the layout, I found out it was started in 2005 about two years after the SRSWF club moved into its permanent residence on Piney Road in North Ft. Meyers, FL. Member Dan Cermack (now deceased) built two 6 foot Ntrak modules. An additional two end modules were built and the N scalers at the SRSWF club were in business with an operating layout. Over the years more modules were built. A total of 11 modules now exist. Not counting the two end modules, they range in size from four to six feet in length. The theme of the layout is the Tidewater region of Virginia and the scenery does a nice job of depicting this area. Interestingly, Dan Cermak came to the SRSWF club from Minnesota where he was an avid ore roads modeler. When it came time to ballast his modules, he used the red ore colored ballast so prevalent up in the ore mining region he was familiar with! A couple of other module modelers followed Dan's ballasting lead. Many of the layout's structures were donated to the club while con't on p.3

all the scenery was done by the individual module builders. A variety of motive power and rolling stock from different eras are run on the layout. Modern power and rolling stock were the order of the day when I visited. While the layout has several switching areas, normally it is operated in "display mode". If the guys want to switch, the layout has an N scale Timesaver module to use. All in all, this is a neat Ntrak layout with a lot going on. I enjoyed seeing it while here in Florida. My thanks to the SRSWF guys for their help with this article.

A big THANKS! to those who did attend and became totally absorbed in watching Art Jones' clinic on Ground Goop and other scenic items and effects. Those who weren't there missed out on Art's lively demonstration of how he does his colorful scenery techniques so quickly. We were able to show Art *in action* on the big "movie" screen as we figured out we can use our video camera as a live feed going through the digital projector. Talk about an up-close and detailed view! Jim Osborn's great camera work kept up with Art's imitation of "The Flash" as he quickly moved from mixing up a concoction of ground goop, to applying it, to roughing-in scenic forms, to adding static grass, and finally adding ground foams and trees. And you thought model railroading clinics could be a little... um, slow? Not this one!

We have two more FVD monthly meetings this season. April's meeting will be on the 22nd with election of officers, and a special preview of an NMRA National clinic presentation. Gary Saxton asked us if he could try his new clinic on Arduino circuits for block and other signals for your model railroad, before he gives it in Kansas City this summer, so we obliged. (You'll see my previously scheduled April clinic next fall.) If you feel intimidated by these fancy electronic circuits, don't be. They're really not bad once you get the hang of them. Our May 20th meeting wraps the 2017-2018 season with Pete Walton's clinic on building his now nationally famous Great Midwestern Railroad, seen in *Great Model Railroads 2018* and several YouTube videos. We'll also look to finalize our summer outing with a location and date, as well as look ahead to the 2018-2019 season. About the Fox Valley Division


If you receive this newsletter you live in the Midwest Region and Fox Valley Division of the National Model Railroad Association or NMRA. The Fox Valley Division (FVD) includes all of McHenry and parts of Cook, Kane, and Lake Counties in northeast Illinois. About 220 members of varied ages and modeling ability levels belong to the FVD. Almost all modeling scales are represented in our division. Membership in the division is free as are the Semaphore newsletters.

FVD monthly meetings are held September through May at the Gary Morava Center in Prospect Heights from 1:30 to about 4:00 pm.
