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# Picture Quiz....


Well, the picture quiz was a real bust. Not one, repeat, not one, call or e-mail, or any other means of communication about the photos.

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# **Region Passings**

It is sad that we have to report to major modeler's passing.

Harry W. "Hank" Brown – Cottage Grove, WI

Harry W. "Hank" Brown, age 65, passed away on Monday, June 16, 2008, after a three year battle with cancer. He was born on Dec. 7, 1942, in Hinsdale, Ill., the son of Harry W. and Dorothy (Lueders) Brown Jr.

Hank served in the U.S. Navy and in the Vietnam war. He married Carol Cutler on July 6, 1963, in Hinsdale, Ill. Hank worked for Madison Metro Bus Co. for 28 years, and owned and operated Shorewood Realty Co. for several years.

His passion was trains since he was a child. Hank was a member of the South Central Wisconsin Division of the National Model Railroad Association, serving as president twice and on the board of directors for more than 20 years. Hank spent many years encouraging modelers and perspective modelers in the love of trains.

He was also a member of North American Rail Car Owners Association and served on their board of directors for many years.

For the past 17 years, Hank and his wife, Carol, owned Wilderness Tours, organizing railroad motor car tours throughout North America. He and Carol enjoyed traveling the world, throughout their 45 years of marriage.

Upon his retirement in 1997, Hank started Train Guyz, building model railroad layouts in people's homes throughout the Midwest.

Hank is survived by his wife, Carol; son, Geoffrey (Lori) Brown of DeKalb, Ill; sister, Mary Beth Webster of LaGrange, Ill.; brother-in-law, John Tone of Des Moines, Iowa; two nieces and their families, Tracy (Barry) Hutchison of Alexandria, Va., and Catherine Tone of Des Moines, Iowa; stepsister,

Julie Webster; and other relatives and friends. A memorial service to celebrate Hank's life was held on June 21, 2008. 

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# **OP-Till-YOU Drop!!**

Wow!! I have been to a couple of operating sessions on other people's layouts and thought how easy this must be to pull one off but what I was actually seeing was years worth of work getting the layout built, operating, and seasoned. I did not realize how difficult it would be until Bob Lehnen asked me to get my railroad operating for CIRROPS at the Muncie Convention.

After a year of furious track building and several operating sessions to get the Utah ready, the big day came. Operators started coming in around 8:45 am and I had scheduled to start orientation at 9:00 am. The problem was that they were told to arrive by 9:30 so actually I was ahead of schedule. My first mistake of many. After getting operators assigned to the key posts of dispatcher, yard masters, and helper crews, we sent out our first crew to explore the railroad. They were a couple of veteran modelers

from the Buckeye state and they were assigned to a westbound slag train at Soldier Summit.

Approximately 30 minutes later they were still at summit with car cards in hand, their Schedule A giving them clearance, no opposing traffic, and they still hadn't moved. Just because you are a master modeler, it doesn't mean that you understand TT&TO operations. After a good ribbing by the dispatcher, they proceeded down the hill and then tied up in Grand Junction. Afterwards, they apologized profusely to me for not knowing what to do, and I even received a thank you note a week later still apologizing. Guys if you read this, you are more than welcome to operate on the Utah at anytime!!

At the end of the session, I asked them during debriefing if they had fun and it was a resounding YES. Even though the railroad did not operate like I wanted it to everybody had fun and we will be much better railroad for CIRROPS in three years.

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# "The Final Cure for Chipped Handrails"

As I was doing some modifications to my motive power fleet, I noticed my handrails were losing more and more paint. The locomotives for my operations based layout are all custom painted Atlas or Kato products. I've tried the majority of the water based and solvent based paints. I also tried the Pactra RC racing paint, but nothing seemed to last. A friend of mine who was in the automotive refinishing business, and also a fine modeler, suggested I tried a product called plastic adhesion promoter. He told me it worked for him.

I went to my local automotive painting supply store and asked for the product. The man came back with a spray can and a specification sheet on how to use it and what it is compatible with. The product he gave me was Plastic Adhesion Promoter by Specialty Performance Products. The part number for this product is SXA 1050. This brand is carried by PPG Industries.(www.ppg.com) When I purchased this 13 ounce can it cost me about \$15.00. It seemed a little expensive to me, but I trusted my friend's advice.

I took the handrails off my Atlas C 424, scraped the remaining paint off of the handrails, and headed to my spray booth. The first thing I noticed is that this product has a very strong smell to it. Be sure to spray this in a very well ventilated area. Luckily, one only needs a little of this product to get the job done. I gave the handrails one light coat and then waited about 5 minutes. I then gave the handrails one more coat as per the instructions. I let this dry for about 10 minutes. I then came back and painted the handrails with my Pactra RC 5104 Basic Red Racing Finish paint. (www.testors.com)

The next day I checked the handrails and was really impressed. I twisted and bent them all around, but nothing cracked. I tried scraping the paint off with my fingernail, but I couldn't do it. I could just feel that this paint was not coming off anytime soon. I am

really impressed with this product. I will be bringing in the rest of my locomotive fleet to have their handrails repainted using this plastic adhesion promoter.
