Horeb as their customer service specialist. Pete loved his new job but did not love commuting two hours up and back to Mt. Horeb from his home in Sun City Huntley, Illinois. So he decided to finish his dream layout (which he did) and pick up and move. The decision was not made lightly, but he was having too much fun at his new job, and the prospect of living closer to his son and his family

Steve Miazga's Missabe Junction railroad was featured in the September issue of Model Railroader. His 18 x 22 layout is in N scale and Jim Osborn, who has operated there many times, says "it is a terrific display of all the aspects of modeling".

Midwestern was the nicest layout he's seen. That was a huge compliment considering the number of layouts Dave has seen and written layout articles about for MR and RMC. But, as nice as the Great Midwestern was, it wasn't enough to save it from the wrecking ball.

Pete got a full price offer for his house as soon as it went up for sale. Unfortunately the new owner did not want a model railroad in his new finished basement. What he did want down there was a big, professional pool table. Pete was able to keep the layout in tact for a Fox Valley Division layout tour on July 21, but on July 22, the tear down began with the removal of locos, rolling stock, vehicles, figures, detailing and a few structures. On Monday, July 23, the tear down began in earnest. By that Saturday, the Great Midwestern was another fallen flag model railroad. A couple of nice scenes, many structures, detail parts, vehicles, some scenery items and some electrical components were salvaged and will be used on other layouts. Pete will be selling the rest of his structures, bridges, and rolling stock at train shows or perhaps on ebay. He's saved a few items from the Great Midwestern, but does not plan to start a new model railroad in Mt. Horeb. To me that's a double dagger to the hobby. Losing a great model railroad is one thing; losing a great model railroader is quite another.





Fox Valley Division Summer Layout Tour by David Leider MMR






