I assume you have seen the announcements stating the 2021 MWR convention, The Rockford Railroad Convention, has, unfortunately, been CAN-CELED. After the earlier postponement from May to September, the RRVD convention committee had continued to work on the convention, but kept running into uncertainties in scheduling. We could not be sure ongoing pandemic restrictions would be reduced in time to allow us to have a full-featured convention. Next year's MWR regional convention will be May 18-21, 2022 when Indy Junction 2022 will be held in Indianapolis, IN. This will be hosted by three regions: North Central Region, Mid Central Region, and Midwest Region, and will be a four-day convention. Another bit of good news – for me, anyway – is that I intend to attend that meet. There will be actual vendors offering items for sale and clinicians presenting clinics. As I mentioned in the last issue of the Waybill, I continue to work on a project for a CID Favorites contest that will be held in November. The rules for the contest are that the display will be no larger than

100 X 100 scale feet (width x length). The subject of the modeling this year is "water". Late last fall, I was able to make site visits and gather photos of the subject I'll be modeling. After the snow got out of the way in early spring this year, photos and field measurements were made of a highway bridge 20-some miles from home. With the data now collected, drawings produced, and supplies stocked, I have been able to move from the research phase and begin the actual construction phase of the models for the display. I'm looking forward to spending a bit more time in the future modeling and working on my layout.

# INDY JUNCTION 2022 Tri Regional Convention 2022

Great News. With the worldwide pandemic coming to a close, we have a special event to announce for 2022!

Indy Junction 2022 will take place May 18 to 22, 2022 and it will be a convention that will rival any that has been or will be offered. The convention will be at the Indianapolis Marriott East Hotel. There will be 4 groups involved in this convention. The North Central Region, Midwest Region, and the Mid Central Region will come together along with the Chicagoland RPM (Railroad Prototype Modelers). This event will be held in 2022 instead of individual Regional conventions.

The RPM Conference folks, led by Mike Skibbe, have hosted RPM Chicagoland since 2016. RPM Chicagoland has a 27-year history with attendance of about 335 people. Their events emphasize clinics and we should expect as many as 30 to 40 different clinics from them in addition to the dozens we will have from NMRA members. Mike, as NMRA's Railroad Prototype Modeler Director, is working to incorporate the best features of RPM style events with the best of the NMRA conventions. The Tri Regional Convention will be the first. RPM clinics tend to address in depth modeling details, operations, and prototype railroad information so there should be an unprecedented number of great clinics to choose from. In addition, the RPM model displays, a key feature of sharing modeling techniques, will be included.

As always there will be top-notch layout tours and op sessions available. All layout tours and op sessions will be self-guided and included in the cost of registration. As currently planned, layout tours and op sessions will be during daylight hours. NMRA clinics will be primarily in the morning and evening hours, however, RPM clinics and some NMRA clinics will be during those daylight hours to accommodate those who do not wish to travel to see layouts or operate. There will be plenty for everyone all during the convention.

For NMRA members there will be the usual contests. For the RPM participants there will be a model display room. There will be many models to see and people to learn from. There will be prototype tours, a non-rail program, a Railyard Sale, and everything else you would expect, even from a National convention.

Finally, there will be a train show. While not as large as the typical National Train Show, it will cover some 20,000 square feet and include hundreds of tables. Most importantly we intend to be very selective in our choice of suppliers. The emphasis will be on small to medium manufacturers that sell great products that you will love but may not be familiar with. Yes, we will have some of your favorite companies and there will be a "traveling hobby shop" or two that will sell a variety of your most often used products. Overall, we want the train show to be a special part of the convention that you will look back at happily after you have spent part of your well-earned money.


Our expectation is that you will consider this convention the best you have ever been to. The convention is designed to be a lower cost, shorter version of other conventions but one that will offer you everything and more. The convention is not in the middle of a big city. The hotel is of lower cost but a fabulous venue with easy access from I-70 and I-465. Parking is free. There are a great number of alternate hotels and restaurants in the area, though we hope you will stay in the convention hotel. The entire convention will be at the hotel, no traveling for the train show or anything else except layout visits, ops sessions, and prototype tours. We will finalize the registration cost shortly, but it will be modest, especially as it will include the cost of layout tours. When you are considering your options for next year, we simply want you to think about this question: "Considering cost, duration, and what is offered - why would I go anywhere else?"

This convention reflects a significant effort to do something different. It was originally planned to fill a gap, as the NMRA National Convention was to be

in Birmingham, England. That convention was canceled but our planning continued. This convention is a big investment in time and money that is being made for you. We hope that we can demonstrate that a convention that is shorter and cheaper, includes everything you are used to, and very importantly includes an additional group like the Chicagoland RPM, is the model for the future, even on the National level. As a member of your region, we hope you will appreciate the effort and resources being invested and plan to attend this convention. There will be much more information made available as time goes on but for now mark your calendars and plan on being a part of your region's efforts to support this event.

## Frugal Modeler by David Nelson

Almost any backdrop adds to the realism of a model railroad to one degree or another, but in years of visiting layouts, and working on my own layout, it is evident to me that the two biggest challenges to having a really nice backdrop are clouds and corners. I may well address the clouds part of the problem in a future Frugal Modeler. For now let's talk about corners: 90 degree corners.

My layout is mounted against two walls that meet in a corner (it extends into the room on both ends, so most of the layout is free-standing. That portion lacks a backdrop). I installed and painted my wall backdrop to my satisfaction. In the corner there was the usual sharp 90 angle where Masonite meets Masonite, which didn't trouble me too much at the time, but as I visited more layouts that had coved corners, with no 90 degree hard-edged corners, the more dissatisfied I became. Some layouts even combined their coved corners vertically and horizontally, at the wall corners and where backdrop met ceiling (these guys must have paid far more attention to high school trigonometry than I ever did!)--a spectacular effect if it's done right.

I was not eager to tear out all or even just part of my new backdrop, nor was I confident I could convincingly match the sky-and-cloud paint job I'd done, even if I felt I had the skills and materials to create a true coved corner. But that hard edge at the corner bugged me more and more (so much so I never took a "before" picture of it). While wandering around in a big box home improvement store I discovered a pos-

sible solution, something called a bullnose corner bead, which is used to create smooth rounded drywall corners. It comes in various materials but mine is thin aluminum for the curve, covered on the outside of the curve with sturdy drywall paper that extends out beyond the curved metal. It isn't expensive.






Here is the "bullnosed" very slightly coved corner of my layout.

By the way, my wife makes few demands about the layout room but did ask that I preserve the light from the few basement windows that we have, so as you can see the backdrop is cut around the window. Our cat loves to perch in that little opening, for reasons only it knows.

Getting back to the bullnose corner bead, its drywall paper made it easy to mount at my corner and blend the paper with the Masonite using spackling paste, smoothed with a damp sponge. I carefully touched it up with the original paints, which fortunately were still fresh and retained the original colors. Is the result as good as Stan's or Mike's true coved corners? Not a chance. Is it better than a hard-edged 90 degree angle? I think so. I wish I could have found a corner bead where the paper is on the inside of the curve rather than the outside, because the curve would be smoother; perhaps such stuff exists. So, yeah, I could have done a better job of it but it is what it is. An internet search shows that there are more varieties of bullnose corner bead (sizes, materials, and angles) than I was aware of and might have been better options for me had I seen them at the store.

A true coved corner is the gold standard but this at least opens up an option for those who, like me, have gone too far down the wrong path but are willing to attempt a modest retro-fit.

The 2021 issue of Kalmbach's Model Railroad Planning magazine has a fine article by Bernard Kempinski about backdrops that opens up another potential use for a bullnose corner bead. Kempinski, writing about both the perspective and artistic challenges of blending a road, or water feature, on the layout surface into the backdrop (yet another sharp 90 degree angle to deal with), makes the point that you need to avoid a visible hard-edged angle by smoothing the transition. He suggested using a fillet of plaster or putty to round (or cove) the joint, to get rid of the sharp angle you'll otherwise have -- so he's actually talking about a very small horizontal coved corner. I think the bullhead corner bead has potential for this use. Just for purposes of this article and this photo, I pushed my remaining piece of bullnose corner bead against my backdrop. I have done nothing to blend or integrate it into either the benchwork or the backdrop, but this is something I suspect I will explore as my scenery and backdrop are developed further. For now I simply wanted to expose the idea and the concept for your consideration. What do you think?

## A New Layout Room by David Leider

I always maintain that the first step in building a layout is preparing the room. In my last house in Illinois, I began with a very rough basement. The walls were concrete and there was no ceiling. I put up studs and sheetrock on the walls and installed a grid drop-ceiling.

In my new house I was lucky that the garage had a nice ceiling and cinderblock walls. Since it is not the cold but the heat that is a problem in Florida, I crawled up into the attic with bales of insulation and insulated it as best I could.

The floor was a problem as it was a typical dirty, rough garage floor. I had an epoxy coating applied, expensive but definitely worth it. I also had the garage door replaced with a new. insulated hurricane-proof one. It sealed extremely well and I spray along the bottom where ants may be tempted to enter. As I said, it is the heat rather than the cold that is a problem. I wanted to insulate the walls, but did not want the time, trouble and expense of studs and plasterboard. My friend who is in the building trade suggested thick foam board (4") insulation. It was easy to cut and apply (with construction adhesive and





aluminum tape to cover the joints). Painting over silver foil took four coats. I would recommend a good quality paint, as I picked up a less expensive white paint and paid for it with extra time painting.

I need 2 workbenches, one for my modeling where I can sit down and another for general

workbench stuff. The old owners left behind an old workbench that I was able to cut down and reuse.


