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Editor's Column

Well, another year has managed to slip away. I hope everyone has a Happy Thanksgiving and Holiday Season.

I sat in (via Zoom) on the last MWR board meeting. Some highlites:

There will be no 2023 regional convention. This is due to many factors, especially a lack of enthusiasm and volunteers.

A regional Advisory Committee is being formed to help any division who would like to host a convention with the mundane things such as registration, advertising etc. With some of the workload reduced, it was hoped that more divisions will step up and host a convention.

(Here in Florida, the board found a good venue for the convention, the local college in Plant City and a very reasonably priced hotel during an off-season week. It was so successful that 2023 will be the third time we are there. It is in a central part of the state, easily accessible to all, and once all the groundwork was laid the first year, it was easy to replicate. No division hosts it, it is all put together by the region.)

Back to the Zoom call. There was a discussion of which divisions held meetings on Saturday vs Sunday. It was in response to wether MWR board meeting should continue on Sunday or Saturday.

For the 2024 regional convention, they were seeking input as to wether any other divisions would be interested in a joint meet.

The spring MWR BOD meeting will be hosted by the Illinois Valley Division. It will be on May 20 in Peoria. The regular meeting will follow division meeting will follow.

In addition to Mad City (see page 10,) some other train shows to consider: Arctic Run in Stevens Point, Wi January 21-22. Holiday Inn Convention Center Rock River Division Train Show will be March 25 and 26

Titletown Train Show will be April 1-2 at the KI Convention center in Green bay Springfield Model railroad Society Train Fair, March 12, 2023 Orr Building. Progress took a few steps backwards on my model railroad. Against my better judgement, I blocked my breaker panel with the backdrop.



I made a cutout to access the panel. As my layout is only three feet wide, it was not too difficult to reach it in emergencies. However, I learned later that every time you change homeowners insurance, they do an inspection of the house. I have already changed insurance carriers once. (I was grand-fathererd in the second time and did not need an inspection as it was less than a year.) But next time I would be in trouble. My only option was to relocate the panel. I thought it would have to go on another wall, and people told me to expect to pay from \$5,000-10.000. A lot of money.

Naturally all work on the layout stopped for about a year as I decided what to do.

I finally decided to take the plunge and called an electrician. He gave me a much less expensive option, putting the box outside, on the other side of the wall. The old box would serve as a large junction box, and could be covered. Best of all, I do not need to have the service wires changed. And best of all, it only will cost \$2,500 and I am upgrading to 200 amps. (Weatherproof outside breaker boxes are allowed in Florida.)

Work will start the week after Thanksgiving, so hopefully by next issue I will have some photos and progress.

President's Report Bob McGeever President, MWR

Several small topics to cover this time around.

Trainfest Returns

Trainfest was held in Milwaukee this November. For those of you who live in the southern half of the Midwest Region, this may not be big news. But for those of us who live "up nort", it is a big deal. The show was cancelled in 2020 and 2021 due to the Covid epidemic. This year the show was produced by Kalmbach Media and Great American Train Shows under license from the WISE division. The WISE and SCWD divisions had booths at the show. While the show was smaller than in the past, there was a nice mix of layouts, vendors, and manufacturers on the show floor. Final numbers are not in at the time I am writing this, but the attendance seems to have been pretty good. Sunday attendance was reported to be very strong. I saw a nice mix of hobbyists and families in attendance. At this time, the plan for the 2023 show is for it to be produced by Kalmbach Media and Great American Train Shows under license from the WISE division.

NMRA Interchange

The Regional Advisory Committee met by video conference using Zoom on November 5th. One of the topics discussed was the soon to be released NMRA Interchange. It is being built on technology from an outfit called Discord.com. If you are really curious, you can check it out on the Discord web site. The NMRA Interchange is supposed to start coming online around Thanksgiving. I have high hopes for the Interchange. If it works as described, it will be an integrated communication tool for divisional, regional, and national activities.

Other Types of Modelers

For the past several years, I have been noticing other types of modelers. Folks who are military modelers, airplane modelers, automobile modelers and ship modelers. I have met a guy who models large, multi-story construction cranes in N scale. He builds all the truss work by hand. Last month I met a ship modeler at a maker-fest who models WW2 era destroyers and destroyer escorts. His destroyer hull is about five feet long. It is not supposed to flex. I have seen some outstanding diorama work at plastic modeler's conventions. The military modelers have developed an incredible array of weathering techniques and supplies that we can use in model railroading. My favorite static grass applicator is made by an outfit called War World Scenics. Not a big name in the model railroad world.

I'm starting to think us model railroaders have become a bit in-grown when it comes to modeling techniques. We should be spending more time with other kinds of modelers and learning how they solve some of the same modeling challenges we face. And we might attract some of them to model railroading.

Regional Membership

In my last report, I mentioned we were going to look into the listing of Life Members in the MWR. I was concerned that we were carrying a large number of Life Members on the roster that were no longer with us. This had come up at some sessions at the Gateway 2022 convention. Neither the regions nor the mothership seem to have a formal procedure for maintaining the Life Members lists. Based on my initial pass through the numbers, I said either model railroading has a positive effect on life expectancy, or we have a lot of passed members on the list. To my great surprise, it appears that model railroading has a positive impact on life expectancy. The division supers found that most of the members on the roster are still with us and in many cases active in their division.

FYI, the average member of the MWR is 72 years old and has been a member of the NMRA for 23.2 years. In 2021 we had 171 regional members who had been NMRA members for less than four years. In 2022, that number had grown to 189. Food for thought.

product introductions, test engineering, and moving products from one production facility to another facility.



Frugal Modeler by David Nelson

"Build a better mousetrap," wrote Ralph Waldo Emerson, "and the world will beat a path to your door." In an oversight, Emerson failed to mention that common mousetraps can supply free HO scale freight car sill steps.

Sill or "stirrup" steps show up in freight car photos going back well into the 19th century. Sill steps are perhaps the most fragile and easily broken detail on our model freight cars and broken or missing sill steps are common on swap meet rolling stock. Interestingly enough, 70 and more years ago, delicate-looking but sturdy stirrup steps made of stamped metal (an "L" shaped part that attached to the underframe) were available on Athearn's and Varney's HO metal kits, and many

decades later when Menzies reintroduced the old Athearn metal kits, those stirrup steps were still some of the most realistic yet durable you could buy, much finer than the sill steps of various widths -- actually, just a mixed bag of staples -- that Walthers sold for years.

When Athearn, Varney and others introduced injection molded plastic freight car kits in the 1950s, the sill steps were cast integral to the car body. While quite oversize (Life Like used old Varney tooling for the train set hopper shown in the photo) they still broke off far too regularly. Modelers that sought to replace them for appearance or durability had few choices; formed wire, or the Walthers staples, both only slightly closer to scale size than the plastic they replaced.

Today we have plastic rolling stock from such firms as Accurail, Intermountain and Athearn with much finer profile cast-on stirrup steps, but fussy modelers who want something closer to scale size replace even those with the excellent HO after-market steps in metal or plastic from A-Line, Tichy, Detail Associates, and others, brands that offer the various styles and shapes of sill steps: straight legs (the classic "U" stirrup) but also with angled or bent legs. In terms of scale accuracy and choice, as well as prototype information about what steps were found on what cars, we in HO are in something of a sill step Golden Age.

And still they break off so darn easily. "OK, just never touch the cars" say the super-detailers. Easier said than done if you have a working layout with operating sessions, particularly if the layout features another modern trend in model railroading: "active" (versus "passive") staging yards with car storage, where cars are constantly being taken off or put on the layout by a yard operator. No, touching the cars is never going to be totally eliminated.


A popular brand of traditional mousetrap comes with a small metal staple securing the hold-down bar in the package. In HO these staples measure a scale 1'4" to 1'2" wide, and about a scale 1.5" thick. The "U" shape is more rounded than a sill step but is easily squared off on a needle nose pliers, as the photo shows, leaving a metal staple that is close to scale for a sill step. While for my best cars I myself do like the A-Line and Tichy steps, I fall low enough on the late Allen

McClelland's "good enough" spectrum that I retain older and less accurate, even trainset quality, cars, with plenty of broken and missing sill steps needing to be replaced.

Since I'm down to my last few Walthers staples, and since unfortunately we go through plenty of mousetraps each winter, I'm more than happy to use mousetrap staples. It is a simple matter to scrape or file off remaining portions of the former sill step, drill holes into the bottom edge of the car side, reinforced, if need be, with a cemented bit of styrene (start with a small starter hole then use a #75 bit) as a near force-fit for the mousetrap staple, the tips of which have a bit of CA on them.

If one "leg" is slightly shorter than the other it's easy to press both legs into the holes. The photo shows an example, this time an actual old

Varney hopper. The photo is not a close-up because, well, this is not the part you'd choose for close ups. It has the basic shape of a sill step and is sturdy. For plenty of cars on my roster, that's "good enough."

P.S. In the prior Frugal Modeler on airbrushing I showed an interesting window vent for my spray booth that has a gate on a bit of 4" tube that can be closed when the spray booth is not in use. I did not recall where I bought it. Dennis Janssen informs me that these plastic vents that mate with a 4" venting hose or tube are popular with woodworkers and can be found at stores and websites that cater to them, such as Woodcraft or Rockler.
